VISION


Our vision is for all students to have access to a high quality, equitable education that prepares them for college, career, and life.

2024 Highlights



Expanding Our Reach

CPLAN participated in several resource fairs, back to school events, and conferences to spread the word about CPLAN's work to families, organizations and professionals that work in the field of family engagement. We presented at the National UPLAN conference and the One Goal Partnership Summit.

2 Advocating for Clean Water Access

Santiago Rivera and Ivelisse Caraballo collaborated with Boston Public Schools to continue replacing water bubblers with filtration systems so all students have access to clean drinking water. This work was supported by Mass DEP and the Shlomo Foundation. Currently, water filtration systems have been installed in over 50 schools, with a scheduled plan in place to complete installations in the remaining schools. Additionally, we have donated 400 water bottles to the Madison Park Technical Vocational High School athletics department.

Reshaping Community Wellness

Dr. Gayl Crump Swaby developed trauma-informed and healing-centered training for parents, educators, and school leaders. This project focused on addressing historical and generational traumas impacting BIPOC communities while equipping participants with culturally responsive strategies to support children and families. By combining her expertise in trauma treatment and multicultural counseling, Dr. Crump Swaby is delivering this curriculum as a integrated component of CPLAN's mission to provide mental health education to the school community to create a safe space for families to better understand their emotional well-being and advocate for systemic changes within schools.



Springfield College

As a Professor of Counseling and the Online/Hybrid Program Coordinator for the Clinical Mental Health Counseling program at Springfield College's School of Social Work and Behavioral Sciences, Dr. Gayl Crump Swaby has been instrumental in shaping the next generation of mental health professionals. Her leadership in the Boston region focuses on preparing counselors to deliver culturally responsive and trauma-informed care, particularly for BIPOC individuals and communities.

2024 Worcester Pilot



CPLAN partnered with Worcester Education Collaborative to launch the pilot of our "Powerful Parents Program" (P3), also known as "Padres Poderosos for a condensed version of our workshop series tailored to their specific priorities.

This program equipped parents with essential tools and knowledge to better understand and support their children's educational journeys. The skills and insights gained through P3 also empowered parents to drive change within schools, fostering more inclusive environments, challenging systemic racism, and addressing barriers that marginalize families in education.

We expanded our reach to over 45 Worcester parents by partnering with Worcester Education Collaborative! This collaboration culminated in our very first graduation ceremony, where parents received certifications and committed to enhancing their education advocacy.



Through dynamic, interactive workshops, parents developed practical strategies to advocate for their children's needs, resulting in increased confidence, improved academic outcomes, and stronger parent-child relationships.

OVERCOMING CHALLENGES



Both cohorts overcame key challenges related to understanding the education system and supporting their children's education.



The Spanish-speaking parents emphasized a greater need for communication in their language and worked to overcome time management barriers, highlighting the need for continued tailored support.

In October, CPLAN participated in a panel discussion about the election ballot questions to help inform families of both sides, ahead of the 2024 Election.

Ivelisse moderated the discussion about Ballot Question 2-Whether MA should repeal the MCAS standardized test.

Ivelisse was also interviewed in a Boston.com discussion about the MCAS high school graduation requirement. While CPLAN did not take a position on ballot Question 2, Ivelisse highlighted the difference in parental opinions on this issue. Parents express concerns about the MCAS's fairness and effectiveness, yet recognize the challenges of removing it without a clear alternative.

Parent Advocacy in Worcester



Noelia drew on the knowledge and tools gained during the workshops to inform her campaign priorities and amplify her advocacy efforts. She also utilized CPLAN's publicly available informational videos about parent power and the role of school committees to help educate families and voters. By leveraging these resources, Noelia ensured that constituents were well-informed about the importance of school committees and the critical role they play in shaping local education.

CPLAN'S ROLE IN SUPPORTING PARENT LEADERSHIP

Noelia's story demonstrates how CPLAN's workshops and accessible resources can empower parents to step into leadership roles in education. Her commitment to ensuring all families have a voice in shaping educational policies reflects CPLAN's mission to equip families with the tools to advocate for equity and student success.

With the creation of our CPLAN chapter in Brockton, we've shown how local collaboration can lead to profound and lasting change in our schools. Together, we've worked with dedicated parents, community partners, and school administration to forge a partnership focused on informing and empowering parents to take ownership of their children's academic environment.

Here's how we've been making a difference in Brockton:









Transitioning from Community Center

Unfortunately, the Brockton Community and Family center is no longer accessible to community organizations at 20 Goddard Street. This space will now be converted to an adult learning center through Brockton Public Schools.

Parent Voice in School Councils

Parents are at the heart of our work. To amplify their voice in school decisions we've focused on coaching them take an active role in School site councils. Read on to learn more about the schools and parents CPLAN helped support.

Navigating the Parent Portal

Each year CPLAN works with Brockton Public Schools IT department to host Infinite Campus workshops, helping families gain access to the parent portal where they can track their child's grades, attendance and assignments. This is available in 4 different languages!

Multicultural Resource Fair

Brockton Public Schools brings together over 200-300 families through an annual resource fair. This resource fair, has been a beacon of hope for the Brockton community, providing a platform for families to access social services, connect with support networks, discover opportunities for stable housing, and other essential resources available to them.



Boston Advocacy

As the educational landscape continues to evolve in Boston, CPLAN is at the forefront, advocating for meaningful, lasting change. Together with parents, educators, and community members, we continue to break down barriers, challenge the status quo, and fight for a brighter educational future for every child in this remarkable city.



Boston Public Schools Community Engagement Advisory Council

Our Executive Director sits on Boston Public School's Community Engagement Advisory Council (CEAC). CEAC is the district's effort to formally enlist and partner with constituent-based organizations and community members to help Boston Public Schools deeply engage all members of our community and invested community members regarding initiatives and policies. It gives the opportunity to network and build trust with community organizations that are in the communities of the families we serve to help BPS understand how to better serve the community.

Our Part:

Enhancing Clean Water Access for Boston Students



Accessible Signage

In 2024, CPLAN collaborated with Boston Public Schools (BPS) to enhance access to clean drinking water for students across the district. Together with BPS, we developed visually clear signage to direct all students, regardless of language, away from faucet water and toward newly installed water filtration stations. Additionally, we partnered with BPS to update the language on their website, making it more relevant and accessible for families seeking more information.

Water Access Improvements

Our Executive Director, **Ivelisse Caraballo**, and Education Equity Advocate, **Santiago Rivera**, played crucial roles in collaborating with BPS to replace outdated water bubblers with modern filtration systems. Now, 50 schools are equipped with these stations, with plans to complete installation in remaining schools over the next few years. This effort was supported by MassDEP and the Sholomo Foundation.

Community Outreach & Education

At the same time, CPLAN's team spread the word about the Water Smart Program offered through MassDEP. **Elsa Flores**, our Education Equity Advocate, distributed materials to around 700 parents, 95 students, and 17 schools. Our presence at key community events, including the Family To Family Conference and the Union Capital Boston Resources Fair, helped us educate families about the importance of clean water and available resources. **Lucy Wickings**, another Education Equity Advocate, expanded outreach through digital communications. We targeted childcare centers across Greater Boston, reaching out via email to 55 staff members and making phone calls to 25 centers to inform them about the benefits of the program. Additionally, we have donated 400 water bottles to the Madison Park Technical Vocational High School athletics department.



National Advocacy



As partners of United Parent Leaders Action Network (UPLAN), CPLAN attended the 2024 annual UPLAN conference, strengthening our commitment to advocating for inclusive policies that empower families and support student success.

Together with parent leaders nationwide, we:

- Shared strategies for creating positive school cultures.
- Met with policymakers on Capitol Hill to advocate for key family-centered policies.

National Advocacy Key Focus Areas



- Advocated for state and federal policies to strengthen partnerships between families and schools.
- Supported increased funding for programs that promote authentic family engagement through Title 1 funding.

Immigration

- Lift the Bar Act: Advocated for access to vital benefits (Medicaid, SNAP, TANF) for immigrant families.
- Cultivate Pathways: Bringing a resource to help support undocumented students in accessing opportunities to attend college and apply for funding.

Ivelisse Caraballo, CPLAN's Executive Director, serves as a member of UPLAN's Immigration Policy Committee, reinforcing our voice in national advocacy efforts.

We also distributed materials about clean water access to around 700 parents, 95 students, 17 schools and 25 child care centers!

Strengthening Academic Partnerships

- Partnered with **Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health** to increase students' understanding of local, community-led public health efforts.
- Collaborated with UMass Boston Counseling & Psychology Department to develop culturally appropriate content for engaging non-mental health professionals and to provide CPLAN with valuable program insights.

Strengthening School Site & Advisory Councils

This year, CPLAN focused on supporting and empowering parent leadership through coaching and guidance to establish and sustain parent-led councils. These efforts created meaningful opportunities for families to influence school policies and decision-making processes, ensuring student success remains at the center.

School Site Councils

Coached parent leaders in establishing and sustaining school site councils at:

- Manthala George Jr Elementary School
- Brockton High School
- Gilmore Elementary School (26 members)

District Advisory Councils

 CPLAN provided critical administrative support, including meeting facilitation, technical resources, and outreach strategies, contributing to an engaged council with 13 members.

2025 Goals

As we continue our mission to push for equitable education, our focus is on four core goals that will shape our journey in 2025. These objectives reflect our commitment to fostering greater parent and community engagement in school councils, advancing racial equity in education, and empowering families with the knowledge and tools to drive meaningful policy changes.



01. Expand Active School Site Councils

Our primary goal in 2025 is to significantly increase the number of active School Site Councils across the communities we serve. We aim to establish strong partnerships between schools and families, fostering meaningful collaboration to enhance the educational experiences for all students.



02. Coach Existing School Councils

In addition to creating new School Site Councils, we are dedicated to providing coaching and support to existing ones. We will work closely with these councils to strengthen their capabilities, ensuring they are empowered to create positive change within their schools.



03. Equity Workshops for Informed Advocacy

To ensure that families are well-informed and equipped to participate in School Site Councils, we intend to expand our racial equity workshops. These workshops will serve as a foundation for advocacy efforts, enabling families to push for equitable policies within their schools and districts.



04. Expanding our Reach

We've received a request to collaborate with Healy Families Initiative in Somerville, where the majority of families primarily speak Portuguese. We will be training a mother to take a leadership role in her very own community. This mom will be trained in our workshops to translate into Portuguese gain the skills needed to facilitate sessions in Portuguese. This initiative will enable us to extend our services to this distinct population while continuing to grow parent leaders.
